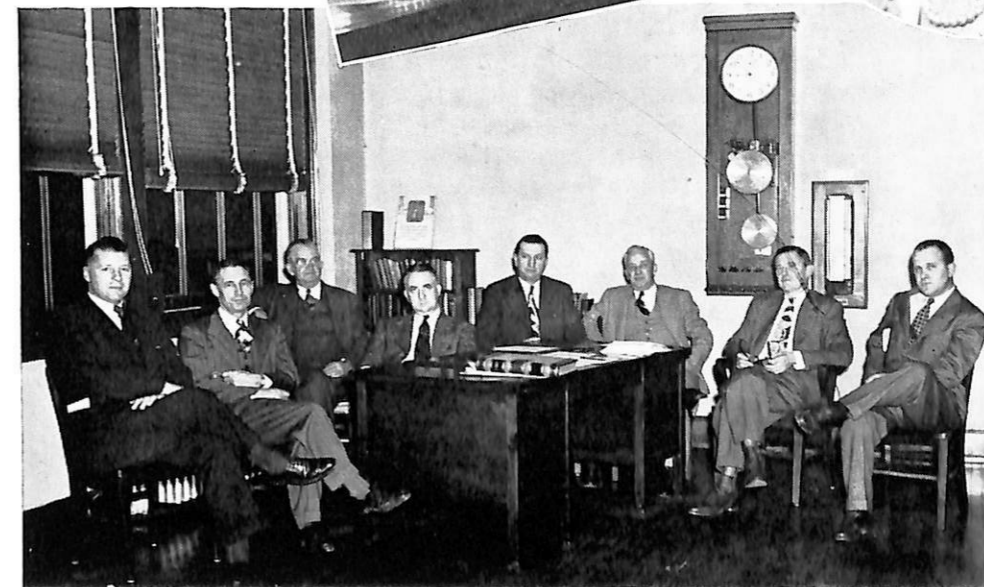

1949 CLASS HISTORY

In September, 1945, the present Senior Class entered Sussex High School eager to learn. We organized the Class of '49 and elected the following officers: President, Richard Textor; Vice-President, Leon Kantenwein; Secretary, Delores Sharpe; Treasurer, Ann Bahney. Mrs. Jones consented to be our class adviser. After going through and surviving the ordeal of Freshman Initiation, we became full-fledged members of Sussex High School. Although the Seniors did a very thorough job on us, we enjoyed it as much as they did. Our class fund was started with our share of the magazine campaign.

At our first meeting in 1946, we selected the following officers: President, Janet Hurst; Vice-President, Bruce Frech; Secretary, Mary Case; Treasurer, William Bennet. Our class adviser was Mr. Pursell. On November 28, 1946, a Thanksgiving dance was held in the gym. Everyone came in Hobo style. It was a huge success and enjoyed by all. In this year we chose our class colors as green and gold, our motto as "Onward Ever, Backward Never," and our class flower as the yellow rose.

We became upper class men in our Junior year. Our class officers were as follows: President, Irene Gilman; Vice-President, Bruce Frech; Secretary, Phyllis Boyd; Treasurer, Mary Case. Mr. Lombardi was our class adviser. In the fall we sponsored a Hallowe'en party at Lake Walkill. Our class rings were chosen early in the fall and arrived prior to the Christmas vacation. A round and square dance was held in the Gym on January 9, 1947. A roller skating party was also held in the spring. Phyllis Boyd was elected to Girls' State, and Bruce Frech and Charles Myslinski were elected to Boys' State. Our Junior play, "A Girl Named Pat," was produced on March 19, under the direction of Mr. Lombardi.

Finally we became sedate and somber Seniors. A queer feeling overcame all of us, for we were

the ones, who would set the example for the rest of the school to follow. At our first meeting the following people took office: President, Ronald Reilly; Vice-President, Phyllis Boyd; Secretary, Betty Dutko; Treasurer, Mary Case. Mr. Lombardi was unanimously chosen as class adviser.

In late September the annual magazine campaign got under way. The total result was \$3,217.80, which topped the previous records.

Freshman Initiation was postponed due to lack of heat in the school. This gave us additional time to think of many more new stunts for the Freshmen to perform. It was finally held on October 22, a huge crowd having attended.

Again Mr. Lombardi consented to help us with the tremendous job of directing our class play, "Our Gal Sal." This play was put on for two nights, November 18 and 19.

This year a separate year book organization was formed. Various members of the Junior and Senior classes were appointed by the Student Council to perform the necessary duties connected with the tremendous job of producing a year book.

In April we held a joint Senior-Junior Prom in the gym.

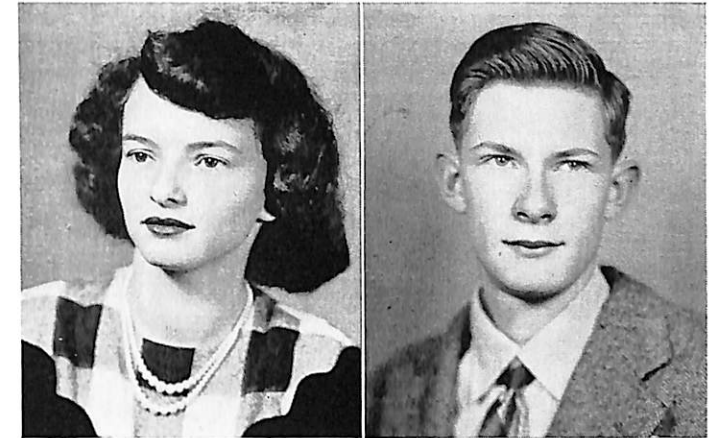

We have gained, from those years, an education that will enable us to go on and push forward through other milestones in life. We have overcome the obstacles that confronted us and have remained the victors.

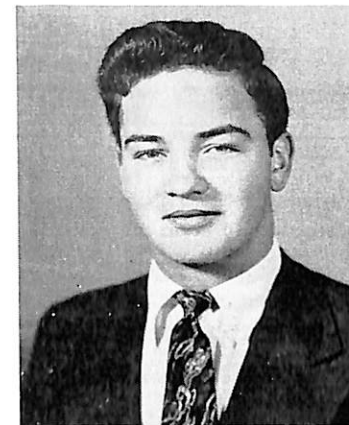

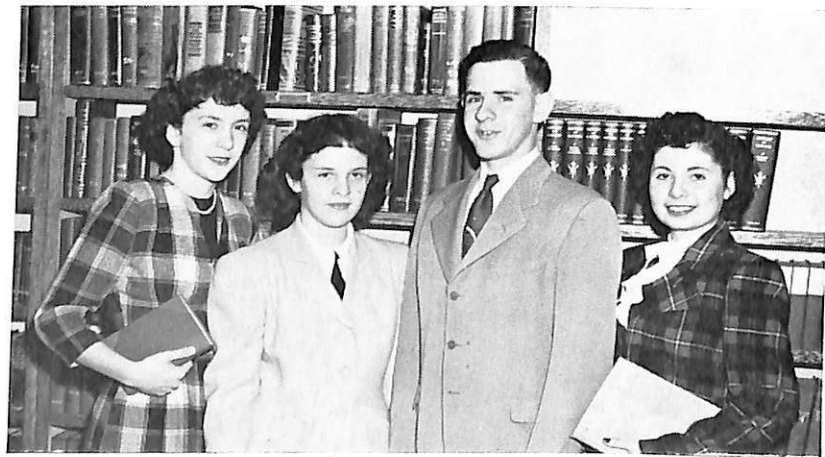
CLASS OF 1950

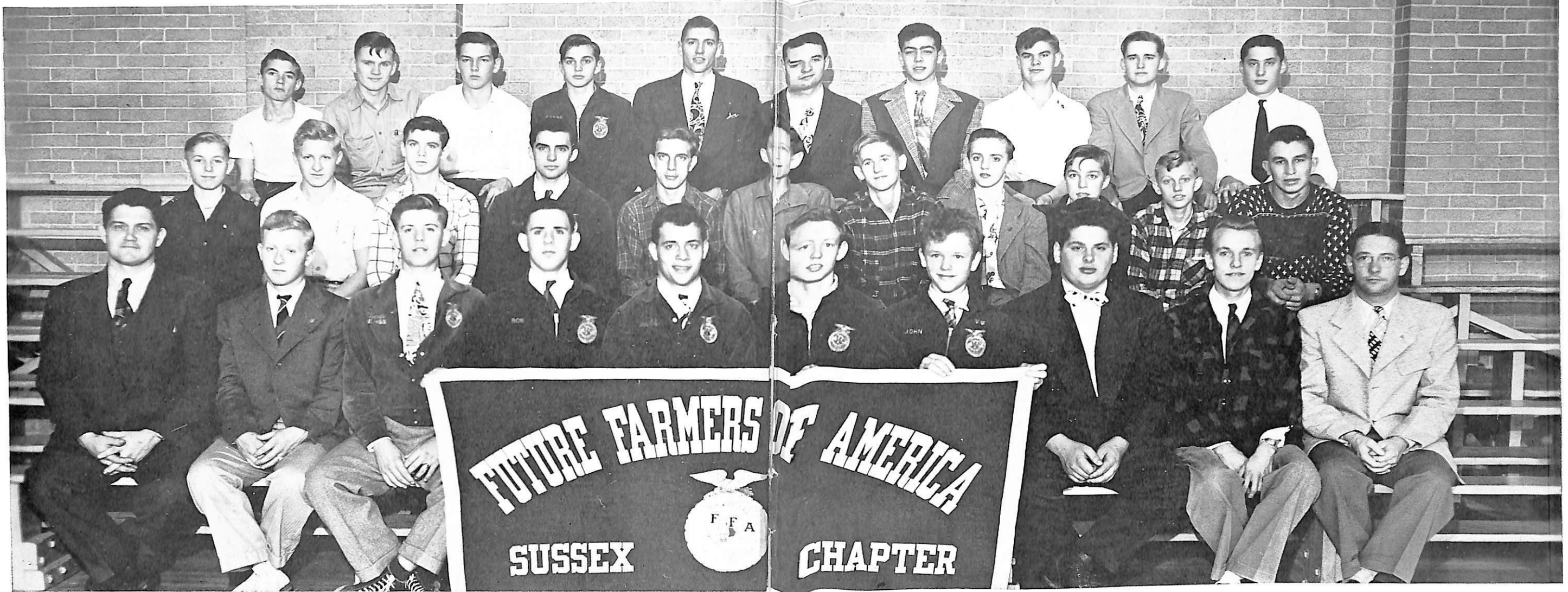
On November 19, we eleven members attended a State Student Council Convention at Princeton, New Jersey. Different members were selected to attend different meetings during the day.

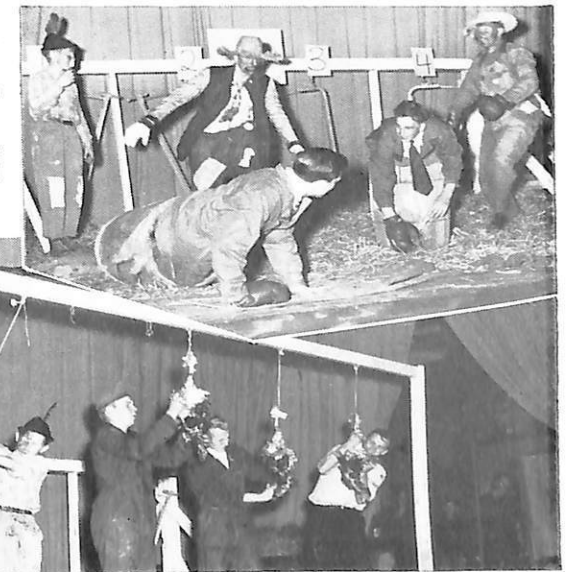
BOXING CONTEST
